MONITORING OF ROCK HERITAGE SITES

24 Rock formations in and around Hyderabad are now listed as Heritage Precincts under the Heritage Conservation Regulations of the Hyderabad Metropolitan Development Authority (HMDA). To help in the active protection of these rock sites, the Society has formed monitoring groups who will visit the areas regularly and report any adverse development to the Managing Committee. The Committee, in turn, will then take up the matter with the HMDA. The groups have started visiting the sites and taking stock of the present situations there. Further information has to be collected from government offices as to the exact boundaries of the sites/Survey Nos.

It will be a great step forward if the Rock Heritage Sites could be fenced or at least demarcated, especially the more extensive ones. Marking with plaques or slabs has been started by HMDA (see last Newsletter). But the actual protection is not guaranteed by merely announcing on paper or on a plaque that the rock site is notified in the Heritage List: active measures for their protection must be taken.

IMPRESSIONS OF THE MARBURG GEOGRAPHY STUDENTS VISIT

With the students and Dr. T. Henning from the Faculty of Geography of the Philipps-Universitaet (University) Marburg, Germany I had visited Hyderabad in February 2010 during a field excursion through South India to study the landscape of the Deccan. The German geographers got an impression of South India's famous inselbergs and monadnock*. They were well aware of landscape evolution, weathering and peneplanation**. The millions of years of genesis of such rocks and their changing appearance under the influence of a changing sea levels, climate, India's continental plate position, and human impact was part of their study. During their visit most of them have seen inselbergs in the Tropics for the first time.

With the help of an excellent presentation, members of the Society to Save Rocks have informed us about their activities. The fact that more and more inselbergs have been destroyed and that even large rock sites listed as heritage precincts are not really protected, shows the need to improve the protection of the existing inselbergs.

What's Anja Huth, a geography graduate from Germany doing in Hyderabad? Well what better place than the Deccan Plateau and our rocky heritage clubbed with her keen interest in Geography, Geology & Botany! It all began with a book she read on Buddhism which lead to more reading and subsequently a dream that someday she would visit India and see the Buddhist pilgrimage centers. The chance came from an unexpected quarter - from her professor, Dr. Christian Opp, who had been to Hyderabad only a few months earlier broaching the subject of contributing some of her time to the Society to Save Rocks while travelling in India prior to taking up a full time job. This seemed to be the perfect combination!

Anja's first impressions of Hyderabad were of chaoti traffic, the economic disparity, the lack of environmental consciousness, which took some getting used to. But two months and several rock sites later Anja is happy she made this trip. "I wonder if there is another place where one can see rocks like the ones in Hyderabad. There is an urgent need

for protection, with stronger regulations and more awareness, perhaps even hoardings with messages that scream out to people to care for the rocks. As a Geographer, my concern is of course the environment. The fact that the flora and fauna of these rocks play an important role

for the biodiversity of the Deccan Plateau, is something citizens need to realize," she says.

As Anja prepares for her travels to North India, the Society acknowledges the long hours that she has put into updating records, making numerous field trips and, importantly making location sketches for all the Rock Heritage Precincts. And is she delighted that she can finally cross Hyderabad roads independently and is embarking on her much awaited Buddhist trail!
